The June Meeting

The June meeting opened to a full house – over 30 members! The June meeting is an important one, however, it also takes place at the beginning of Summer vacation season. When Buzz talks, people listen.

We all have different interests when it comes to the art of blacksmithing. Buzz has developed a deep interest in the tools of the trade. He is interested in the history, the usefulness, the value, and the availability of the large tools: anvils, blowers, forges. He is also interested in all the other necessary tools. Buzz talked to us at the June meeting about several different types of anvils. He described Peter Wright and Mousehole anvils from England, and Hay Budden, Fisher, and Trenton anvils, which are made in the USA. He also

discussed the presence of and uses for the Hardy hole and the Pritchel hole and how to determine a general age for an anvil depending on whether or not these holes are present. So, what kind of anvil do you want? The way I see it, anvils are like wine (or beer, Jeremy). Do you like it? Does it serve your purposes? How much do you really want to pay? And... can you move it if necessary? Do you really want a 500 pound anvil? What if you find the anvil of your dreams, but that anvil is dinged up a bit and needs some repairs??? Do your research, then talk to Buzz. He's happy to help you make your choice.
